Module Overview:

Introduction to Gender and Diversity explores a range of identity discourses, positioned within the field of literary studies. The module engages with constructions of gendered identity within culture-based categories such as gender roles, non-binary identities, race, nationality, globalization and the media, and the ways in which these categories underpin contemporary debates about diversity. Equally, the module examines how various mediums have enabled debates about gendered identities. We will consider how these debates are characterized by a focus on subjectivity, performativity, intersectionality, sexuality and an interrogation of heteronormativity.
