Student-centric Learning

We adopt a student-centric approach to learning, which gives our students greater responsibility in their learning journeys. It begins with a **Bachelor of Social Sciences (BSocSci)** programme with direct Honours in any of the following disciplines:

- Economics
- Psychology
- Public Policy and Global Affairs
- Sociology

Students also have the choice of taking up a Second Major after their first year of study, providing them greater breadth of study in an additional discipline. They have the option to pursue a Minor as well, offering them the opportunity to explore their interests apart from their Majors while complementing their areas of specialisation.

Additionally, internships will be mandatory for all NTU students. This enhances students' employability and career mobility when they graduate.

Our faculty members are highly dedicated teachers and exceptional researchers. They come from diverse cultural backgrounds and from leading local and international universities, and leveraging their experience and expertise, help prepare our students for a globalised working world. ECONOMICS

Economic principles underpin decision making in areas such as consumption and production, competition and trade, banking and finance, economic development and policies, as well as social issues relating to poverty, equality, health, and the environment. It is a powerful discipline that cuts across interdisciplinary landscapes of business, human behaviour, health, technology, and society.

The undergraduate Economics programme at NTU emphasises the application of econometric and quantitative analysis tools to applied issues on economic, finance and public policies. The programme provides a solid foundation in microeconomics, macroeconomics and econometrics while offering a wide selection of field courses to suit students' interest.

Their research and expertise also include, but not limited to, the economies of Singapore and ASEAN, China and East Asia, labour economics, behavioural economics, and game theory. In addition, they have served as consultants to prominent international organisations, advised local institutions and government ministries, and made their expertise available to statutory boards in Singapore.

Our faculty regularly publish in major international and often-referenced journals as well. The *Singapore Economic Review* – a major journal in Asia Pacific – is housed within NTU Economics.

PSYCHOLOGY

Psychology is the scientific study of human behaviour and cognition and is a multifaceted discipline that traverses various fields such as anthropology, biology, neuroscience, philosophy, and sociology. In NTU, students will develop varied interests in the specific fields of psychological research and their applications – from the biological to the socio-cultural basis of psychology, and from basic scientific discovery to mental health and business applications.

The four-year curriculum at NTU Psychology provides students with comprehensive education in psychology. Striking a balance between breadth and depth, our core courses provide students with basic knowledge of the main fields of psychology, while our elective courses provide students with opportunities for focused study in more specialised areas, particularly in areas of current psychological research.


Our Faculty

NTU's Public Policy and Global Affairs programme is the first undergraduate programme in Singapore that offers public administration and international relations. It was established to meet students' growing interests and career aspirations in these two areas of study.

Students will gain multidimensional practical knowledge in areas such as policy analysis, public financial management, international politics, and comparative public administration. The professional training in political dynamics, international politics, comparative public administration, and global affairs also lays a solid foundation for graduates to pursue multiple career paths in governmental and non-governmental organisations both regionally and internationally.

SOCIOLOGY

Sociology is the study of social conditions and relations—how they are formed and what their consequences are. It is the broadest of all social science disciplines as all spheres of social life—cultural, economic, political—are open to sociological enquiry. At NTU, students will learn to analyse the social conditions that shape human lives and confront difficult issues such as migration, poverty and inequalities, the changing face of religiosity, shift in family forms, aging, mental health, welfare regimes and social policies, and science and technological disruptions.

The curriculum in this programme is intellectually stimulating and rigorous. The academic foundation consists of three core areas: Economy, Technology and Society; Culture, Self and Identity; and Organisations and Organisational Change. Students will develop the ability to think through complex issues, investigate them empirically, and go beyond conventional wisdom.

DOUBLE MAJORS

The Double Major programme is a four-year, direct Honours degree programme. Undergraduate students will read two majors chosen from among the disciplinary strengths of the four schools in the College—School of Art, Design and Media (ADM), School of Humanities (SoH), SSS, and Wee Kim Wee School of Communication and Information (WKWSCI).

This programme will offer students the opportunity to discover the strengths of each major academic discipline while developing an intellectual flexibility and broader range of analytical skills. Students will be equipped with versatile, real-world skills that effectively prepares them for an ever-changing social and employment landscape of the 21st century. The Double Major degree programme will also help to facilitate comparative intellectual insights, and nurture students' maturity to engage in different perspectives, research approaches and interpretive strategies.

The weightage of each major is equal, and students will have the opportunity to complete Graduate Projects from each major. To graduate with a Double Major Bachelor of Social Sciences, students will need to complete 139 Academic Units in this course. Both majors will be reflected in the same degree certificate.

Students will be admitted into this Double Major degree programme at the point of entry to NTU, and declare their two majors at this point.

SECOND MAJORS

A Second Major provides students with a breadth of exposure in their chosen subject. Students can opt to pursue a Second Major after their first year of study in another discipline offered by SSS, or one offered by another School within HASS.

Admission into a Second Major will be based on cumulative grade point average (CGPA) scores at the end of their first year of study. It is subject to availability of vacancies and requirements for each Major.

Students will need to read 11 courses specific to the field of study, which includes both the Major Core Subjects and Major Prescribed Electives. They will have to complete 135 to 138 Academic Units to be eligible to graduate with a Second Major.
