

ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR XU YAN


Journalism School Fudan University, 2022

My six-month tenure as a Visiting Scholar at WKWSCI was a pivotal and profoundly enriching chapter in my academic career. My decision to choose WKWSCI was deliberate. I was driven by a desire to break new ground in my research, and WKWSCI's standing as Asia's premier communication school made it my top choice. Furthermore, its location in Singapore was essential for the on-ground fieldwork required by several of my ongoing grants.

However, the most critical factor was the opportunity to work under the mentorship of Professor Ang Peng Hwa, a former ICA president whose expertise and global perspective I knew would be invaluable. The intellectual guidance I received from Professor Ang was truly transformative. Through our discussions, he helped me identify a crucial need for stronger theoretical construction in my work, shifting my approach from historical summarisation to genuine theoretical discovery. His questions challenged my existing 'China-centric' perspectives, compelling me to deconstruct long-held assumptions and re-evaluate my research framework from a truly global standpoint. This paradigm shift has fundamentally reshaped my academic identity and the quality of my research.

The academic environment at NTU was equally stimulating. NTU's reputation as a technological powerhouse also gave me a front-row seat to the rise of AI generated content. The interdisciplinary conversations with faculty from engineering and computer science broadened my horizons and sparked a lasting interest in the intersection of AI and communication. My focused research time at NTU yielded significant progress, enabling me to complete three major grants. The new theoretical mindset and international perspective inspired by Professor Ang directly led to nine of my papers being accepted for presentation at top-tier international conferences, including International Association for Media and Communication Research (IAMCR), World Association for Public Opinion Research, and National Communication Association. Inspired by NTU's tech-forward culture, my teaching has also evolved significantly. Our academic collaboration has continued to flourish since my visit: from my honor in facilitating two online lectures by Professor Ang for Fudan in 2023, to recently presenting my new research at the IAMCR 2025 conference hosted by WKWSCI itself, this cross-institutional friendship has been vividly brought to life.

My time at WKWSCI was more than a visiting scholarship; it was a catalyst that propelled my research, teaching, and international collaboration to a new level. I am immensely grateful to Professor Ang and the entire WKWSCI community for this exceptional opportunity.



PROFESSOR ZHU PENG

School of Economics and Management Nanjing University of Science and Technology, 2022

As a visiting scholar, I chose WKWSCI because of its strong global reputation and the opportunity to collaborate with Professor Alton Chua. WKWSCI is widely recognised as one of Asia's leading schools in communication and information studies, offering a vibrant academic environment that bridges theory, technology, and practice. Singapore's role as a hub of innovation and cultural diversity further made it ideal for meaningful research exchange. My decision was particularly shaped by the chance to work with Professor Chua, whose

scholarship in knowledge management and online communities aligns closely with my own research. His methodological rigor and ability to connect academic insights with practical applications provided me with invaluable mentorship. Through joint discussions and seminars, I refined my research questions, strengthened my analytical framework, and learned to situate my work within global academic conversations. The programme also enriched me in three important ways. Academically, I gained exposure to cutting-edge approaches in information and communication studies. Professionally, I expanded my international network through interactions with faculty and peers, opening possibilities for future collaborations. Personally, I deepened my cross-cultural communication skills and broadened my perspectives by engaging with diverse viewpoints.



ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR CHEN RUI

School of Journalism
Communication University of China, 2022

In 2022, I chose to pursue a one-year visiting study at WKWSCI, with the support of the China Scholarship Council. NTU, though a relatively young university globally, has a long historical origin. It boasts an international faculty and students from all over the world. Moreover, the WKWSCI ranks first in Asia in the field of communication and media studies. Therefore, I finally decided to pursue my visiting scholarship here. During my visit, with the assistance of Prof Edson Tandoc, WKWSCI

provided me with a comfortable office space and a relaxed research environment, and introduced me to its student training and curriculum system. My collaborating supervisor, Prof Chen Lou, organised discussions with current doctoral students on my research topic, and we worked together to complete the paper. Sharon offered great help in administrative and daily matters, assisting me with various procedures. This one-year visiting experience was pleasant and highly rewarding. I witnessed how excellent teachers conduct research and teaching, and how the vibrant WKWSCI supports faculty and students in their research and studies. Beyond academic research, I gained deep insights into Singapore's ethnic integration and social management. It was a meaningful experience, I cherish the memories of this year.



ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR WANG YAN

Zhejiang University of Technology, 2025

I came, left, returned, and am soon to leave again. My relationship with WKWSCI has been one of comings and goings. On February 29, 2024, I returned to WKWSCI, where I once spent four months as a doctoral exchange student from NCCU in 2017. This time, I began an 18-month postdoctoral fellowship, funded by the China Scholarship Council. Coming back to where it all began, I felt like I was meeting it anew. In seven years, the world had changed. Aside from the winding slopes that still define NTU as a "lost palace," everything else, which included people, roles, rhythms, was different.

I had to reorient myself in a place I once thought familiar. Life flourishes here. And history is drafted here, too. Before Singapore's 60th National Day, I witnessed many historical moments: the diamond wedding anniversary of WKWSCI's founding dean and NTU's second Emeritus Professor, Eddie Kuo, and his wife, Ms. Effie Lo Kuo; Prof. Christopher Khoo's violin performance, as the only professor featured on the #OneNTU menu; the appointment of WKWSCI's first Chinese chair, Prof. Jack Qiu, who co-chaired IAMCR 2025's local committee with Prof. Edson C. Tandoc Jr.; and Chinese scholars now comprise two-thirds of the visiting scholar program managed by Dr. Sharon Quek.

In today's polarised and uncertain world, Singapore: civil, stable, and deeply humanistic, has become an ideal destination for scholars. Administrative costs increased accordingly, yet people often say, "But your professor is NTU's top professor, Prof. Ang Peng Hwa." That's true. Having Prof. Ang makes everything worth it. In today's hyperreal AI era, one of academia's few remaining privileges is physically present, in this place, in this moment. I joined Prof. Ang's classes, co-authored papers with him, and presented at international conferences in Australia, New Zealand, and Brunei under his guidance. Gradually, my research focus grew from journalism to AI ethics.

"Research is the most important thing," Prof. Ang emphasised. But when I struggled with slow-efficiency, he said, "Research is also mentally demanding," and instead asked after my well-being. Prof Ang taught me what it means to be a real professor. He led by example, always making time to meet despite his packed schedule.

Our debates echo through Corridor Two in WKWSCI. Even when we disagreed or when he disagreed with others, I never hesitated to trust that he was probably right. Truly, the greatest blessing is that my professor is Prof. Ang.

Education offers a lifelong guarantee. What Prof. Ang and I shared go beyond academia; just like my lasting ties to Singapore, even when abroad. During a one-month research stay in Taipei before Lunar New Year, I realized how much stable housing boosted productivity. This insight led to my op-ed in Lianhe Zaobao, "A First-Class University Deserves a First-Class Housing System," calling for better accommodation for visiting scholars. It was also a heartfelt appreciation to WKWSCI and NTU for being a home in the world, and an intellectual sanctuary during my midlife renewal.



WON YOUNG CHUNG

Sungkyunkwan University, 2025

I had the opportunity to apply for a Visiting Scholar position at WKWSCI, NTU Singapore. This application was made possible through the research funding I received from Sungkyunkwan University (SKKU), located in Seoul, South Korea. I was very grateful for the support from SKKU, as it enabled me to pursue this valuable academic and international experience at one of the most prestigious institutions in Asia.

There were several reasons why I chose WKWSCI at NTU as the destination for my visiting scholarship.

First and foremost, NTU consistently ranks among the top universities in Asia and globally, especially in the field of communication and media studies. WKWSCI, in particular, is well known not only in Singapore but also across the broader Asian region. It has earned a strong reputation for its cutting-edge research, global academic collaborations, and the high quality of its faculty and students. The school's interdisciplinary and innovative approach to media and communication research aligns closely with my academic interests, which made it an ideal environment for professional growth and research development. In addition, I believed that being affiliated with WKWSCI would allow me to engage with a highly diverse academic community and expand my scholarly network. I aimed to build meaningful connections with both faculty members and graduate students at WKWSCI, which I hoped would lead to future collaborative research opportunities. I also anticipated that this experience would significantly enhance my academic credentials and contribute positively to my long-term career development, particularly as I planned to pursue a tenure-track position in the future.

My expectations were met and even exceeded during my time at NTU. Through academic seminars, research meetings, and informal discussions with other faculties and/or other visiting scholars, I was able to deepen my knowledge in media studies and exchange ideas with scholars who are leaders in the field. The intellectual environment at WKWSCI was vibrant and inspiring, providing me with both the motivation and resources to further develop my own research agenda.

Following the completion of my Visiting Scholar programme, I was fortunate to be appointed as an Assistant Professor at Pukyong National University, located in Busan, South Korea. I firmly believe that my experience at NTU played a significant role in helping me secure this faculty position. The exposure to international research standards, the experience of conducting research in a globally recognized institution, and the expanded academic network I built during my time at WKWSCI all contributed to strengthening my academic profile and professional readiness. Starting in September 2025, I will begin my new role as an Assistant Professor in Busan. I look forward to applying the insights and experiences I gained during my time at NTU to my teaching and research activities in Korea. I am also hopeful that the relationships I developed at WKWSCI will lead to ongoing academic exchanges and collaborative projects in the future.
