What are you currently working as?

I am currently in my fourth semester of the Doctor of Philosophy in Educational Leadership and Policy programme. I am part of the Policy and Leadership Studies (PLS) Academic Group at National Institute of Education, Singapore (NIE). After obtaining my Bachelor's degree at Vietnam National University, Hanoi and Master's degree at Stockholm University, Sweden, I gained professional experiences through full time teaching, publishing supplementary workbooks for high school students in Vietnam, and working as a research associate in Singapore.

What attracted you to a higher degree programme at NIE?

My application for the doctoral studies at NIE was quite random. My former lecturer strongly recommended me to apply for a research scholarship with the school. Luckily, it turns out to be one of my best career ons
