DEAN'S MESSAGE ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR LIU WOON CHIA

Dear Student Teachers,

Pelcome back to the Second Semester of the Academic Year! I trust that you all have had a restful and enjoyable school break, and are ready to face the exciting challenges of a new term ahead. In this message, I would like to share something which is close to my heart as an educator and I hope it will be meaningful and inspiring to you as you continue your learning journey here in NIE to become a future educator.

If we ask around, we will realize that good teachers come in different moulds and use different techniques. It is their passion and enthusiasm for the subject and an ability to connect their self, subject and students in the fabric of life, that makes them good teachers.

Often, people perceive teaching as merely using techniques to impart knowledge but it is definitely so much more than that! Good teaching involves passion from the

heart and requires the integration of subject knowledge, inner-self-awareness, students and teaching techniques. The best teachers are those who are able to infuse their identity and integrity with their subject knowledge and enthuse to inspire learning. In the process, they create that inter-connectedness with their students or even engage their own hearts. In essence, we teach who we are to our students through our subject and our interactions. Teaching, in this sense, is like holding a mirror to the soul.

Sharing from my experience, I think I rely a lot on my identity and purpose as an educator. I was first touched by excellent teachers in the past, and they have taught me so much about what it means to be a good role model for my students. It is passion and understanding of the subject that enables one to connect with one's students, and in turn to connect them with the subject. Of course, when teachers invest themselves in their teaching, they and their subject might become susceptible to

judgment, opinions and even critics, and that is when teaching becomes daunting and teachers falter.

MESSAGES

When this happens, I would like to encourage you not to lose heart and start pulling away from your subject, students and even yourself. Instead, take a moment to regain your identity and integrity by listening and responding to the teacher within you. Take time to reflect, have a moment of peace and quiet or turn to any other ways that help you to reconnect with your inner self. It is by doing so that you will be awoken once again to the voice of identity and integrity, and the teacher within. I myself am definitely still learning to do this!

When you have the time, do also read "The Courage to Teach: Exploring the Inner Landscape of a Teacher's Life" by Parker Palmer - you'll certainly gain some insights and find encouragement.

I do hope that you will benefit from this sharing and continue to keep that passion to teach alive. I wish you a happy and fulfilling semester ahead.

TEACHERS' INVESTITURE CEREMONY 2014


NIE celebrates the graduation of 1446 new teachers as they prepare to enter the teaching force and to fulfill their calling to impact and shape lives.

n July 2014, the Teachers' Investiture Ceremony, that was held over two days in the Nanyang Auditorium at the Nanyang Technological University, saw the graduation of a total of 1,446 new and returning teachers. I wanted to step out of my comfort zone to explore, learn and grow, and make my university life as encirching as possible. I believed this experience would help me to become more independent and mature. Also, I was interested in finding more about the education systems in European countries.

WHAT WERE THE MAIN THINGS YOU DID DURING PRACTICUM?
We spent the first three days in Denmark attending a two-day

Denmark attending a two-day course in the host university, University of College Capital (UCC). For the next two weeks, we observed how the Denmark teachers taught in the school. For the third to fifth week, we were assigned to teach a Grade 5 (Pri 5) and Grade 6 (Pri 6) class English and Maths.

HOW WAS IT LIKE DEALING WITH THE VARIOUS GROUPS OF PEOPLE DURING YOUR PRACTICUM?

The principal, Head of Departments, Teachers and supervisors were all very friendly and supportive towards our teaching style and the lesson plans that we crafted for the classes. I felt comfortable asking them for any help or advice.

WHAT WAS YOUR BEST MEMORY?

My best memory from practicum was Caramel Day in Randersgades Skole. It's an annual tradition that the school celebrates in conjunction with the graduation of the Grade 9s. On this day, graduating students would get to dress up in any costume. At noon, they would be given one hour to run around the whole school with waterguns. As a "reward" for getting shot, juniors would be able to get sweets from the seniors. What I found interesting was the inter-level bondedness, and how the whole school had rallied to support the graduating students. Also, the teachers showed their love for the students by participating actively too!



WHAT WAS THE GREATEST CHALLENGE?

I feel that the greatest challenge is the language barrier, as English is not their first language in Denmark. Thus, it is quite a challenge to communicate with the students especially when giving instructions and trying to explain some difficult mathematical/English terms.

WHAT ADVICE WOULD YOU GIVE TO A STUDENT TEACHER GOING FOR THIS PRACTICUM?

Go with an open mind. Be flexible and adaptable and learn as much as you can because it is definitely a worthwhile and fulfilling experience. More importantly, enjoy every moment there!

HOW IS INTERNATIONAL PRACTICUM DIFFERENT FROM THE PRACTICUMS DONE IN SINGAPORE?

The work load such as preparing for lessons is less tedious as we get to teach in a pair during international practicum, while in Singapore they have to teach the class individually. This definitely makes it less stressful!

There is also a lot of trust and respect between the teachers and students. The teachers and students are like friends yet at the same time students still respect teachers as an authority figure.




