7 QUESTIONS WITH THE DEAN

Dean of Office of Teacher Education A/P Liu Woon Chia shares with VOICES about her love for nature, having a work-life balance, and setting New Year's resolutions.

If you did not become a teacher, what career path would you take?

My dad wanted me to be a doctor, and my mum thought that I should be a lawyer. But I would probably become a vet, because I really love animals!

What do you like the most about working in this office?

The work is meaningful. We constantly strive to refine our programmes, and bring teacher education to the next level. It's nice working with a passionate group of people who share a common vision. That keeps me going. I also treasure the interaction with student teachers. I used to teach in schools, so the interaction is something I really enjoy.

If you had one superpower, what would it be?

I don't really need any. Some might want teleportation—it sounds interesting, but I like travelling and I find that the joy is in the journey! So it won't be fun if I miss out too much. Others might like time travel—it lets you bypass certain situations, but I think every experience makes you the person you are. Life is about

experiencing both the good and bad parts.

What do you do in your free time?

I'm an outdoor person. I love doing things like trekking and scuba diving. If I have the chance, I would go to nature and places where I can walk. In fact, in December 2014, we brought our 12-year old twins to trek in Nepal.

Are you a workaholic?

No, I am not! I work very hard, but I also play very hard. Every 10 weeks or so, I try to take a break, either by travelling or doing something different. I would switch off from office work. We all need to recharge.

Do you have any 2016 resolutions?

I don't make New Year resolutions because I never keep them! [laughs] But there are certain things that I hope to work on in different areas of my life. As a mother of 14-year-old twin boys, I think about the sort of mother I want to be. Just like being an educator, there has to be a balance between how much structure you put in, and how much autonomy you give them.



On the NIE front, in 2016, we want to focus on building the Enhanced Degree Programmes and the Teaching Scholars Programme. Our pioneer batch of degree students in the new programmes is moving on to Year 3 this year. They will be going for their semester exchange and international practicum. We want to continue to explore new placements for them in countries with strong education systems.

In addition, NIE has recently partnered the Academy of Singapore Teacher in the setting up of the Centre for Teaching & Learning Excellence in Yusof Ishak Secondary School. The development of the center will be an exciting time for NIE and our student teachers!




TRAINEE TEACHERS' CLUB

TEACHING STUDENTS WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

tudents with special needs are wonderful, smart, and capable learners. While teaching these learners in a class of students can be a challenge, it is also important that all students are given the chance to succeed. Teachers should find ways to reach all learners, not just the ones who can do the work.

The students from the Early Childhood and Special Needs Education Academic Group would like to give you three things to know about teaching students with special needs:

PUT THE PERSON FOR STATE OF THE DISABILITY

Use Person-First Language. Our learners are people first, so we need to treat them as such. It is not, "the learning disabled child"; instead, it is "the child with a learning disability".

Using person-first language can help eliminate old, prejudicial, and hurtful descriptors. The person always comes first, the disability is second.

WHAT YOU DO FOR STUDENTS WITH SPECIAL NEEDS IS GOOD FOR ALL OF YOUR STUDENTS

Strategies used to teach students with special needs also benefit typically developing children.

For example, many students with special needs need structure, clear expectations, visual aids, kinesthetic activities, and positive reinforcement. These strategies have also proven to be effective for helping all children.

SOCIAL GROWTH VS ACADEMIC GROWTH

School should be a place that provides a sense of safety and allows students to foster positive relationships among teachers and peers. Social skill and social growth are primary and crucial to our lives as adults. It is important that we focus on these needs as well as the academic ones.

Often, social development will have a much more lasting impact on our students' overall success in life.

Finally, please remember that we all have disabilities. If you are reading this wearing glasses, your disability is easy to spot. The difference is that a problem with vision is a disability that society has accounted for, and there is no stigma associated with it.

You have **SUPERPOWERS** as a teacher- please remember to use those powers to reach and serve ALL of your students. Thank you for the work you do!


